## Letter from the Director.....

Dear Governor and Legislature:

This past year's challenges also brought about opportunities to partner with other agencies to remain the lead organization in the state for the prevention of child abuse and neglect. The dedication of our staff and many committed partners has allowed the efficient and effective targeted programming to make a marked difference in the lives of many Alabamians. According to the University of Alabama it cost approximately \$111 per individual to provide prevention services and approximately \$52,000 for an individual entering the system.

Maintaining a focus with each community partner concentrating on the Five Protective Factors will and has strengthened Alabama families; research shows the incidents of child abuse and neglect will be lower. Providing skill based training to public service professionals, private providers and parents on the Protective Factors will support a solid foundation for our children and translate into the creation of healthy families and healthy communities.

The Department of Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention has been very successful in placing an emphasis on child death in the (0-3) age range from "Shaken Baby Syndrome" or Abusive Head Trauma and Unsafe Sleeping environments. We have seen these numbers drastically reduced through grass roots efforts, training, and public awareness. This project alone has saved an untold number of infant lives over the past three years.

Concentrating on responsible fatherhood in a systemic and successful manner earned the department an additional \$2.5 million dollar federal grant. This funding will create programs that voluntarily enroll non-custodial fathers to develop the skills necessary to be a strong parent and support physically, emotionally, and monetarily their child (ren).

The beauty of prevention is not always immediately visible but as we watch the numbers of children in the juvenile justice system decline, the numbers of fathers paying child support increase and fathers exercising more frequent visitation with their children, we know patience with prevention saves many pounds of intervention.

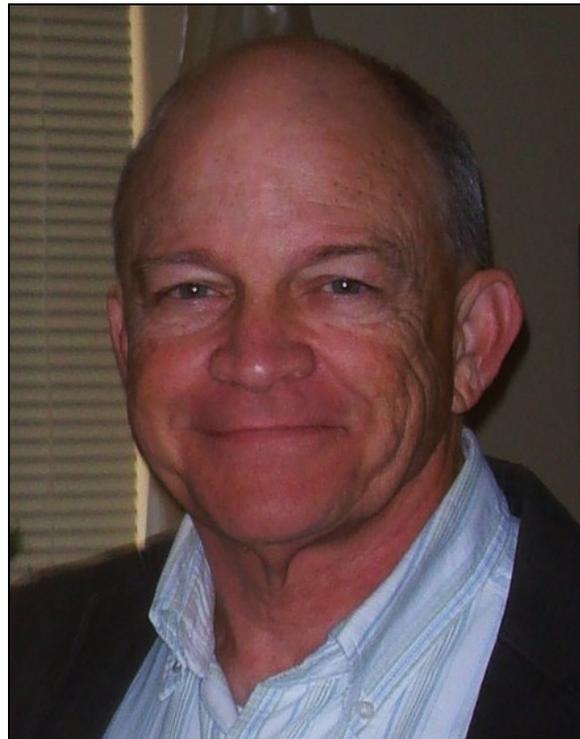

In 2011, Colonel McCall was sworn in as director of the Department of Public Safety following his appointment by Governor Robert Bentley. Colonel McCall provides leadership and direction for all state police services.

# CHILDREN FIRST TRUST FUND

## 2010-2011 ANNUAL REPORT

The Children's First Trust Fund (CFTF) was created from funding related to the Tobacco Settlement dollars awarded to the State of Alabama. The Department of Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention (DCAP) receives approximately 5 percent of the revenue. In 2010, DCAP received \$1,282,888 in CFTF funds that supported funding for the University of Alabama Evaluation Project and 53 programs statewide. These programs include:

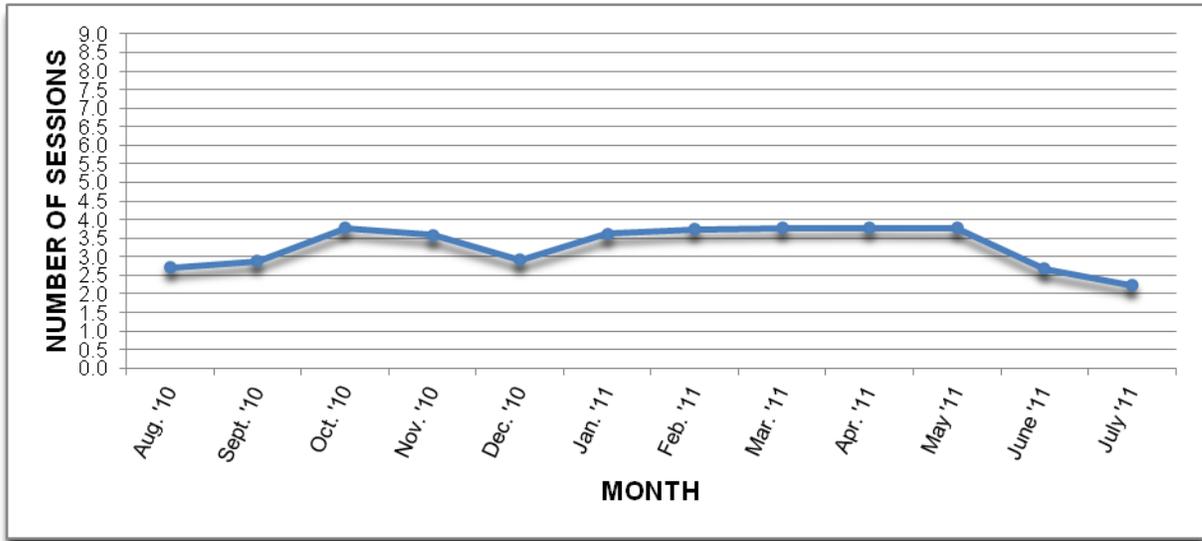
- **(15) Home Visiting**
- **(25) Parenting Education and Support**
- **(14) Non-School-Based**
- **(4) Respite**
- **(1) Mentoring**
- **(2) Public Awareness and Training**
- **(1) School-Based**

All grantees received training on infant death from Abusive Head Trauma and Unsafe Sleeping Environments and were provided educational materials on tobacco cessation. During site visits, technical support is provided to grantees to ensure program compliance and fiscal best practice standards are in compliance with the Department's requirements.

Based on data from the University of Alabama Evaluation, the Children First programs served a total of 8,365 individuals. **2,795 of those individuals served were children ranging from ages 0 to 18. These evaluation results prove Children First programs are having a significant impact on children and families throughout Alabama.**

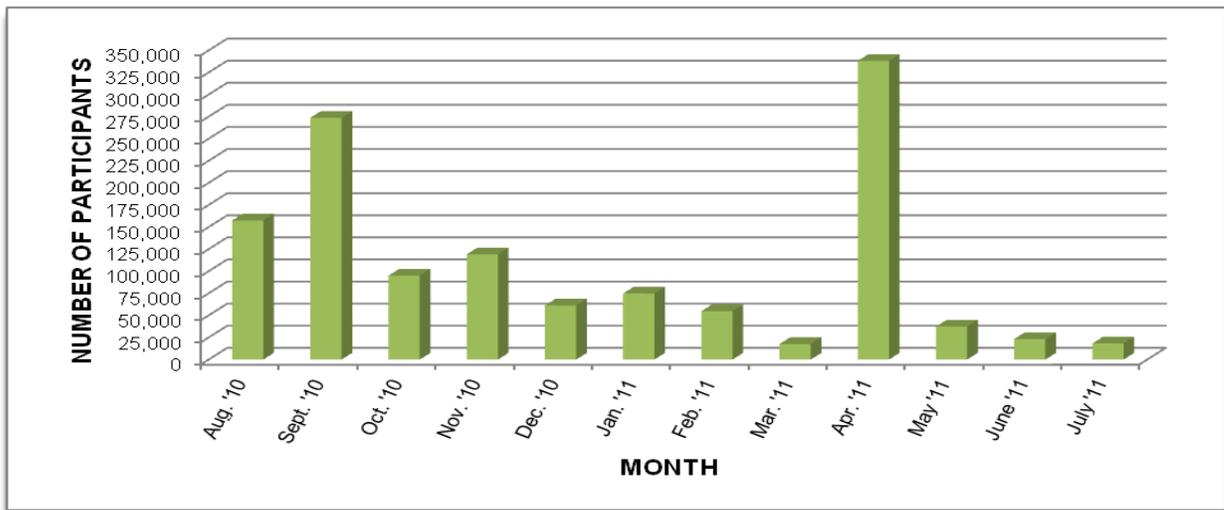

# COMMUNITY BASED CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION 2010-2011 ANNUAL REPORT

Community Based Child Abuse Prevention (CBCAP) programming is a part of the title II Legislation of the Child Abuse Prevention Treatment Act (CAPTA). The primary purpose of the CBCAP Programs are to:

- 1) support community-based efforts to develop, operate, expand, enhance and where appropriate, to network initiatives aimed at the prevention of child abuse and neglect;
- 2) support networks of coordinated resources and activities to better strengthen and support families to reduce the likelihood of child abuse and neglect; and
- 3) to foster understanding, appreciation and knowledge of diverse populations in order to effectively prevent and treat child abuse and neglect.

With CBCAP funding, states focus their funding on the following areas:

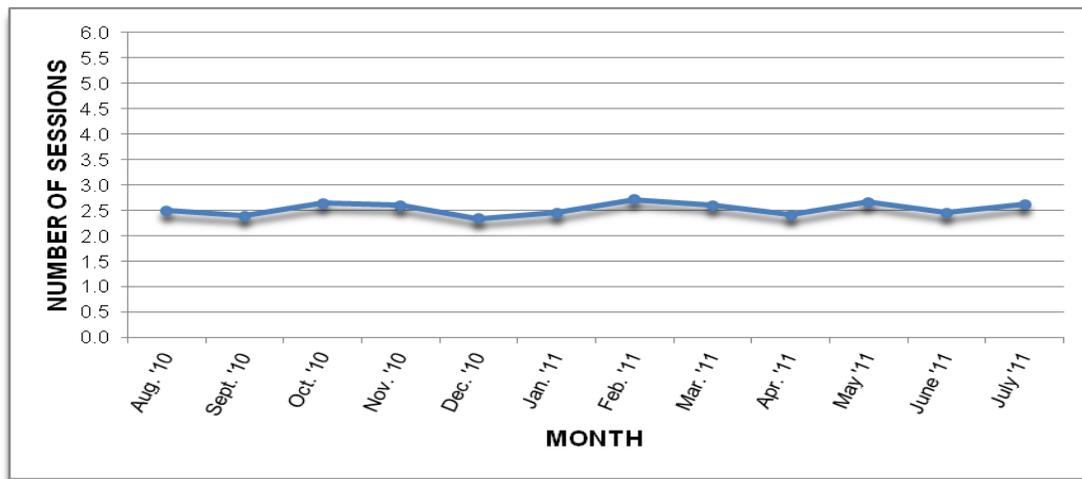
- Prevent child sexual abuse;
- Child deaths in the zero to three age range;
- Abusive Head Trauma/ Shaken Baby;
- Child Care expansions;
- Respite Programs;
- Public Awareness
- Leveraging Complex Systems;
- Standards of Excellence;
- Building public/private partnerships;

The Department of Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention/Children's Trust Fund (DCANP/CTF), received funding in 2011 from the Administration of Children and Families in the amount of **\$286,560**. This funding was budgeted for salaries, training/conferences, parent leadership, and peer review, as well as funding to support 9 community-based programs statewide. These programs provided direct services to 111 children between the ages of 10 to 18. The programs also provided indirect services to 187 children residing in the home of an adult.

DCANP and CBCAP are strong advocates for respite programs. With CBCAP dollars DCANP was able to fund programs which provided respite services for **522 families**, who received a total of **17,844 hours** of respite during 2011.

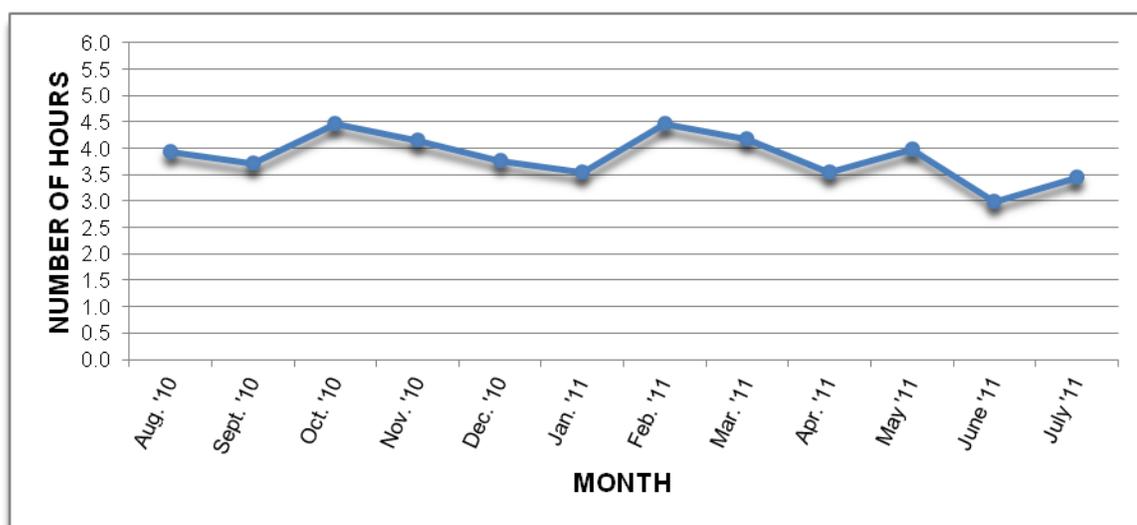

The total number of contact sessions for the entire year for CBCAP programs was 8,458.5 sessions with an average number of 9.2 sessions per client.

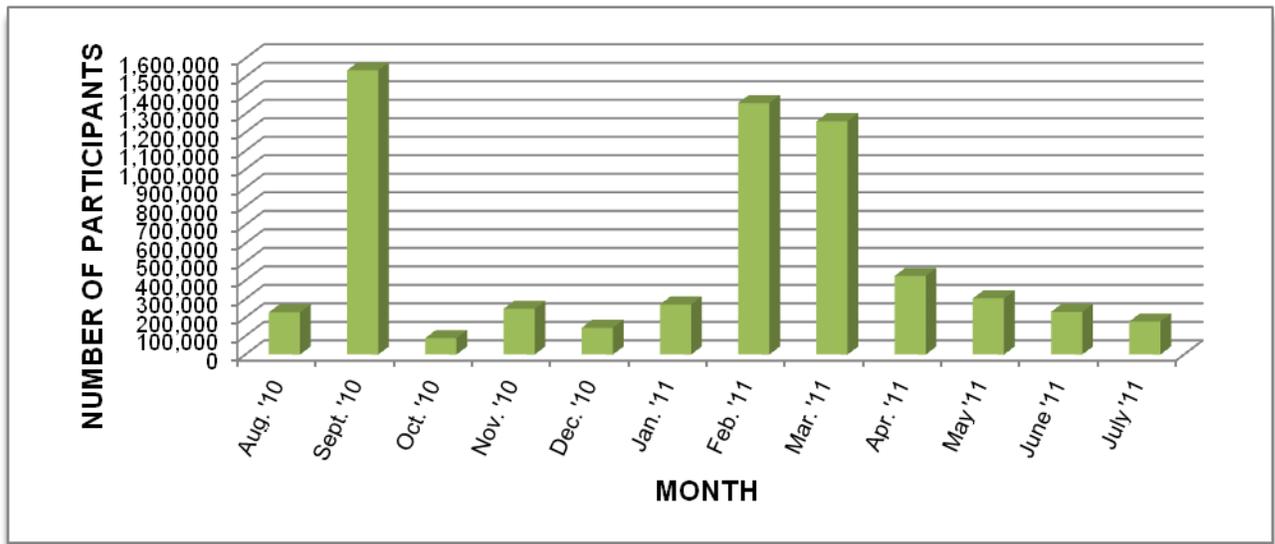
**Average Number of Contact Hours for Clients in

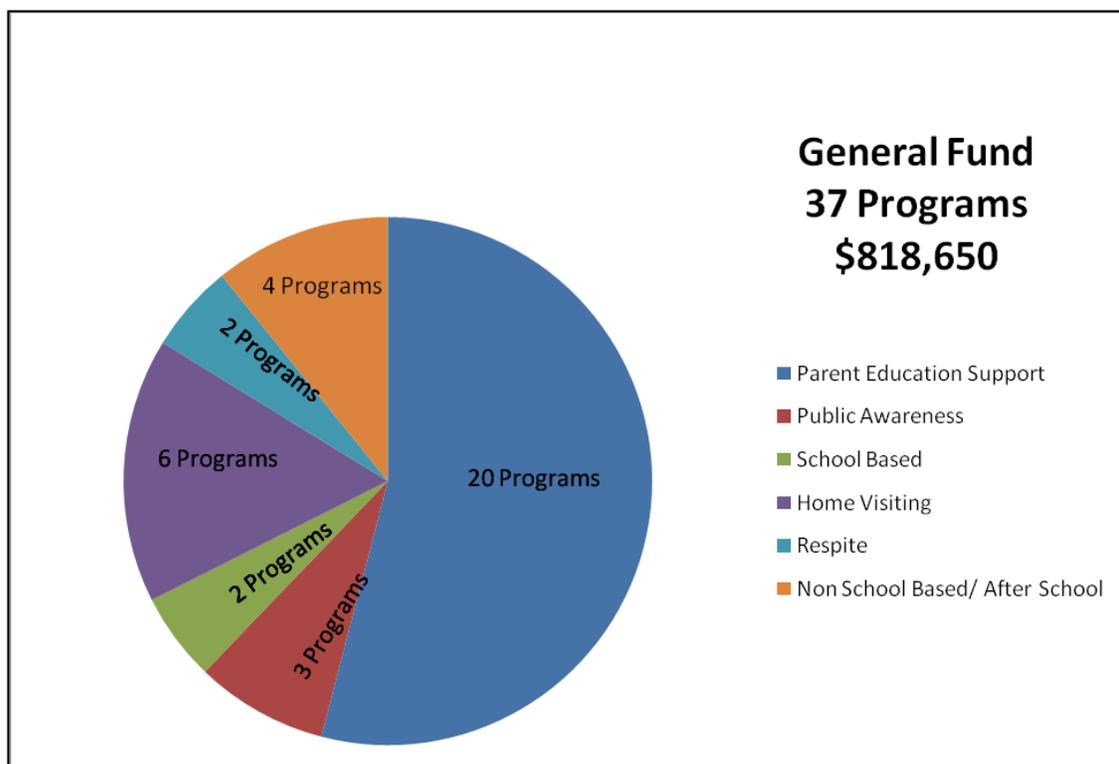
**Number of Participants Served by Public Outreach/Awareness Activities

# TRADITIONAL PROGRAMS 2010-2011 ANNUAL REPORT

## General Fund

DCANP uses state dollars to fund Traditional Programs, which are aimed to impact child abuse prevention at the primary level. During FY 2010-2011, \$818,650 was allocated to fund 37 programs directly serving 5,465 clients. The total number of contact hours were 80,836 with an average of 16.30 hours per client. Over the course of the program year there were 1,004 public outreach and awareness activities by programs funded through the General Fund.



# MENTORING CHILDREN OF PROMISE

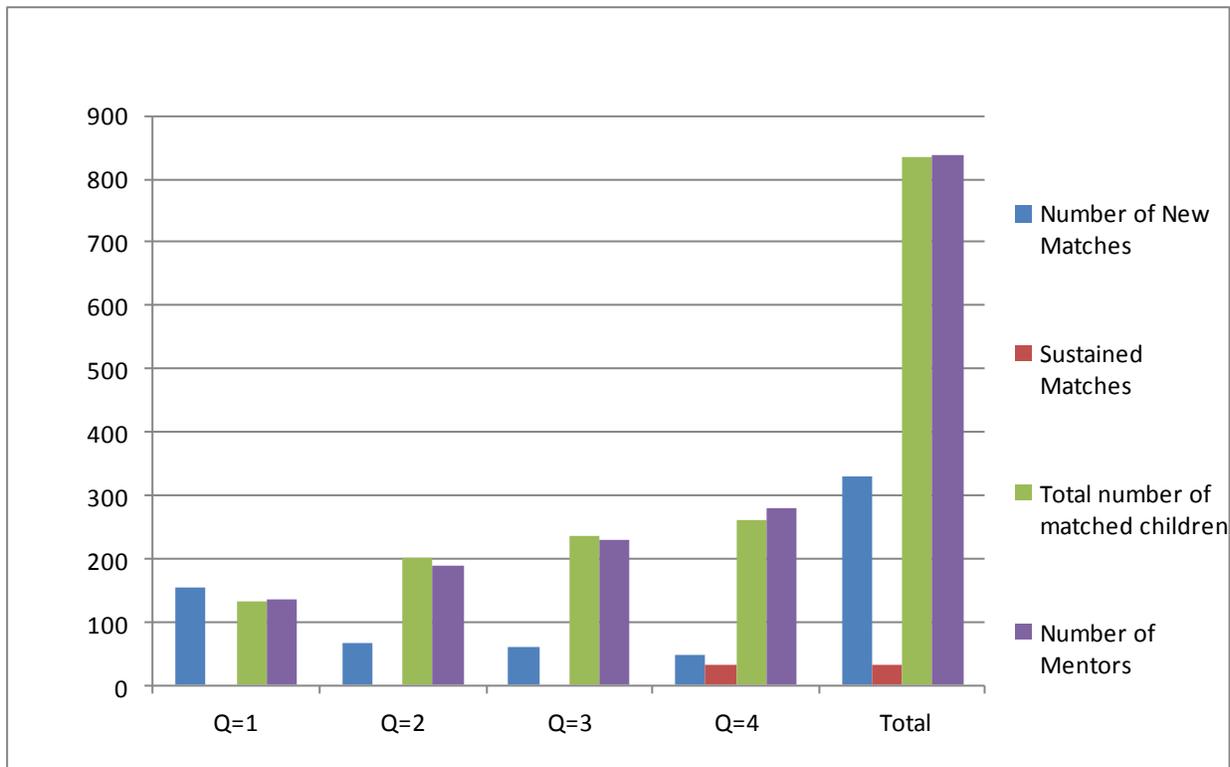

Congress established the Mentoring Children of Promise Program through the Promoting Safe and Stable Families Amendments (Public Law 107–133), and assigned the administration of the program to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). In 2006, Congress also reauthorized the Mentoring Children of Prisoners Program under the provisions of the Child and Family Services Improvement Act of 2006 (Public Law 109-288).

DCANP received \$1,353,025 to fund 11 programs for the 2010-2011 grant year. During the year 1,214 clients were directly served. MCOP program grant recipients are required to provide services, both directly and in collaboration with other local agencies, to strengthen and support children of incarcerated parents and their families. This includes preserving families and connecting the children with their imprisoned parent when appropriate. Grant recipients are required to cultivate mentors from within the child's family and community through recruitment, screening, training, and monitoring/evaluation:

- **Recruiting:** Grantees are required to recruit mentors who are committed to spending at least one hour per week with their assigned child for a period of at least one year.
- **Screening:** Grant recipients are required to screen volunteers extensively through appropriate reference checks, criminal background checks, and child and domestic abuse record checks, to ensure that they pose no safety risk to the young people.
- **Training:** Mentors must attend an orientation and training in mentoring skills and the practice of mentoring before being assigned to a young person. In addition, grant recipients are responsible for matching each child to a suitable adult mentor.
- **Monitoring and Evaluating:** Grantees are required to provide ongoing support and oversight of the mentoring relationship to ensure that young people are receiving appropriate support and are benefiting from the mentor match. Outcomes for each participating youth are measured by such factors as academic achievement and avoidance of risky behaviors.

# FATHERHOOD PROGRAMS

## 2010-2011 ANNUAL REPORT

Through a partnership with the Department of Human Resources, DCANP receives federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) dollars to fund Fatherhood programs across Alabama. These performance-based contracts are awarded to programs who provide opportunities to families with a non-custodial father. Activities (training, workshops, conferences, counseling, etc.) are conducted to encourage and facilitate active parenting by non-custodial fathers. The goal is to increase the father's involvement in their children's lives, as well as increase child support payments/collection. Target population for Fatherhood Programs should include (but are not limited to) non-custodial fathers who have a DHR child support case and who:

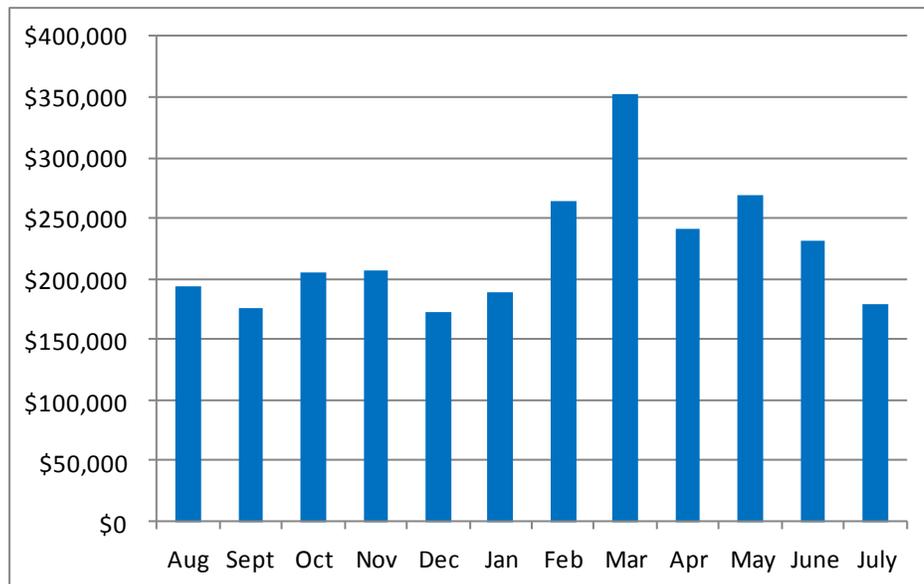
- are unemployed or underemployed (income less than 200% of the federal poverty level);
- lack a high school diploma or GED;
- lack the skills to obtain gainful employment.

For 2010-2011 DCANP received \$978,000 TANF funds to address the needs of fathers and noncustodial parents. In Program Year 2010-2011 the Fatherhood programs accomplished the following:

- served 2,812 clients;
- collected \$2,661,342 in child support payments;
- helped 745 gain employment;
- 51 completed educational programs (GED or college);
- 124 were enrolled in educational classes at end of the PY;
- 50 completed skills courses such as welding;
- 23 were enrolled at the end of the year in short term skills training.

**TOTAL FUNDS COLLECTED = \$2,661,342**



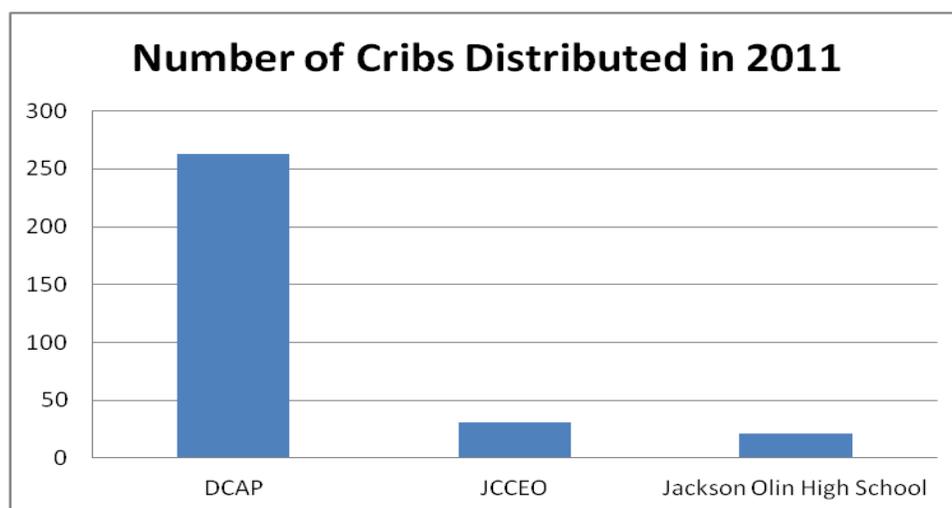
# PROJECT TO END CHILD DEATH (0-3) 2010-2011 ANNUAL REPORT

The Jefferson County Pilot Project kicked off 2011 with the Infant Death Prevention Conference held in February in Birmingham. The conference supported the creation of a critical community response to abusive head trauma and unsafe sleeping environments for infants. National Speakers addressed Proper Death Scene Investigation Techniques (Patti Toth, Washington State Criminal Justice Training Commission), Initial Management of Abusive Head Trauma (Dr. Melissa Peters, Children’s Hospital of Alabama), Infant Death and Prosecution (Jefferson County District Attorney Brandon Falls) and the Impact of Abusive Head Trauma on the Family (Scott Juceam and Patrick Donohue). The target audience was child advocates in general, nurses, social workers, counselors, first responders and law enforcement.

Committees of the Pilot Project continue to meet. Training activities are being focused on first responders and police cadets and focus groups are being planned for pregnant or new mothers in high schools in the Jefferson County area.

The Mentoring New Moms Program is being conducted at IMPACT Family Counseling Center. Over 21 matches were made during 2011.

During 2011 over 300 new or expecting mothers in Jefferson County Received new Graco Pack n Plays through the Department of Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention’s partnership with Cribs for Kids®; this program significantly impacts child death from unsafe sleeping environments



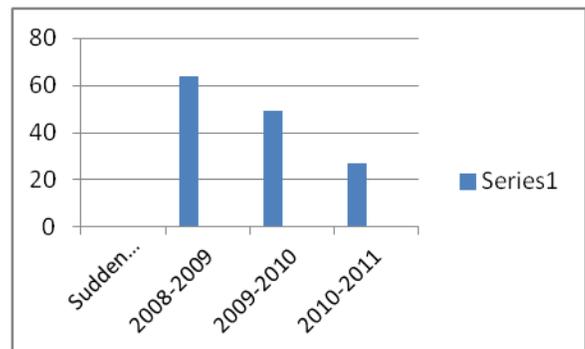

### Unsafe Sleep and Abusive Head Trauma

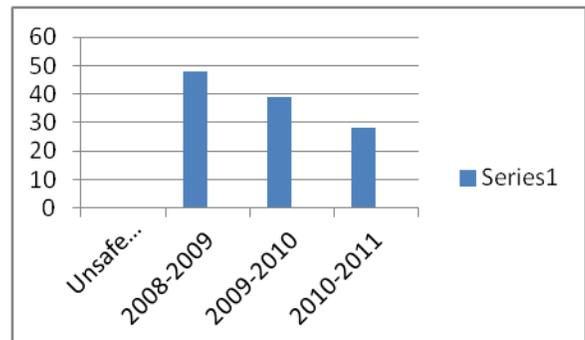
#### Sudden Unexplained Infant Death

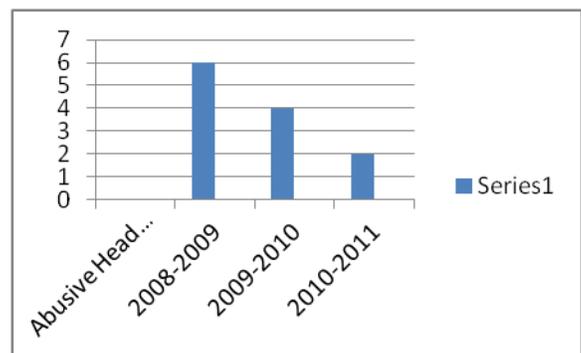
#### Unsafe Sleeping Deaths

# BUDGET NARRATIVE

## 2010-2011 ANNUAL REPORT

The Accounting division of the Department of Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention, “*Children’s Trust Fund*” and is responsible for budgeting and expenditures. The division is striving for the highest level of accountability, transparency and monitoring of the budget and expenditures. The division is charged with accounting for the receipts of State, Federal and Local funds. The division is also responsible for disbursements of funds to grantees after the approval of the Board of Directors. The funding categories are closely monitored to avert over charging of different funding streams.

In 2010-2011, DCANP the amount of grants disbursed to grantees and special projects was \$5,069,985 and the administration expenditure was \$3,210,212. The administration expenditure includes but not limited to salaries and benefits, travel in state and out of state, repairs and maintenance, rentals and leases, professional services, supplies and materials. Our goals, mission and objectives are to make sure that the tax payer’s dollars are expended in most efficient and effective manner.

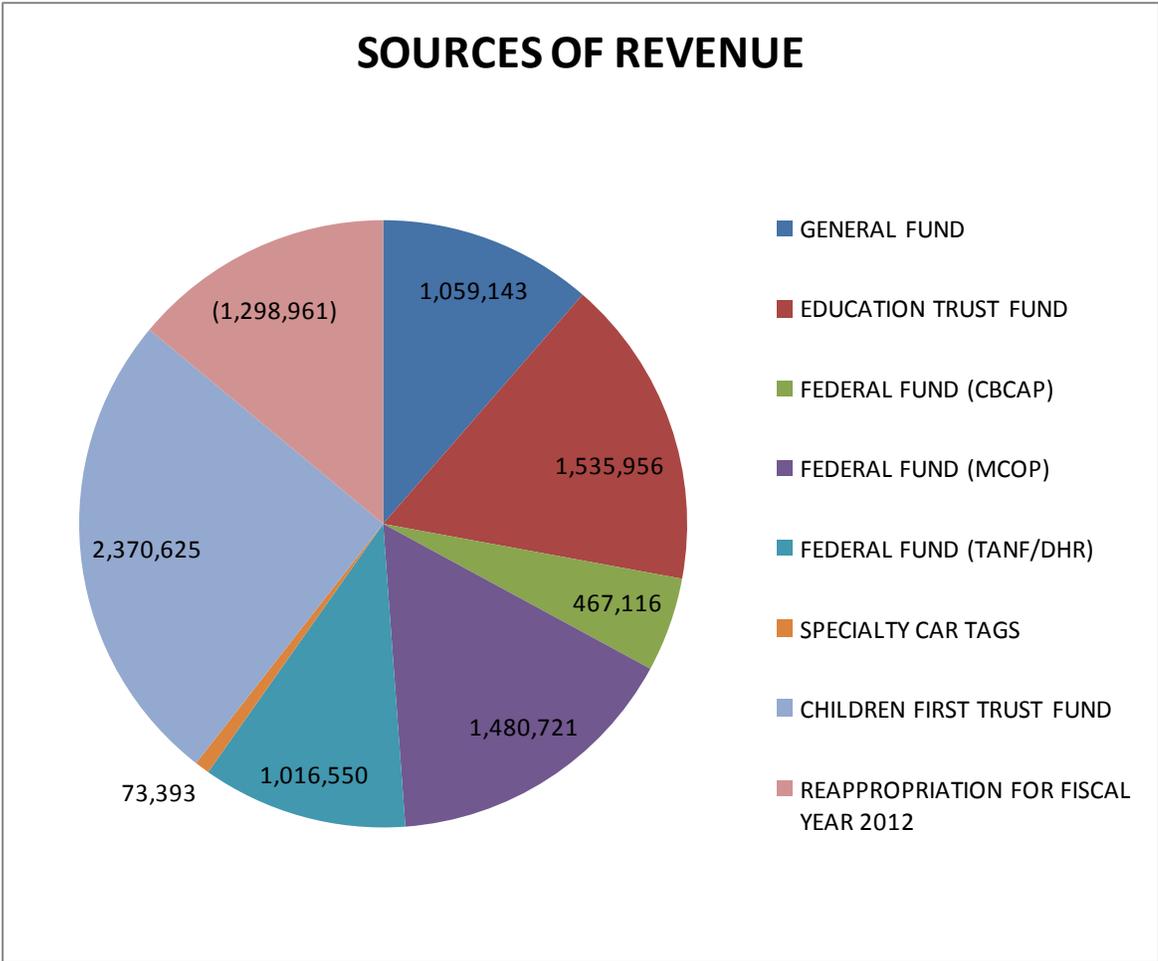

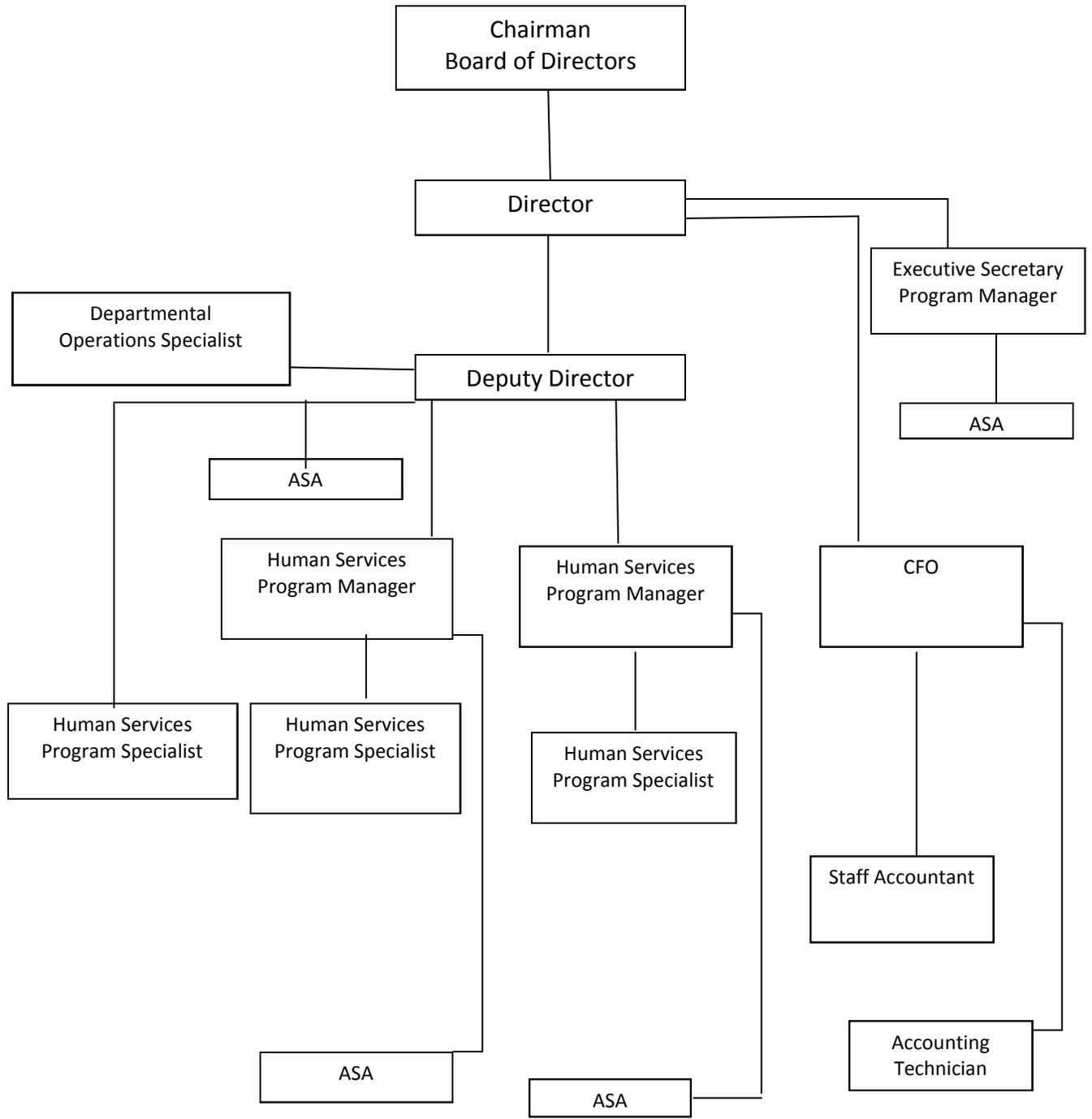

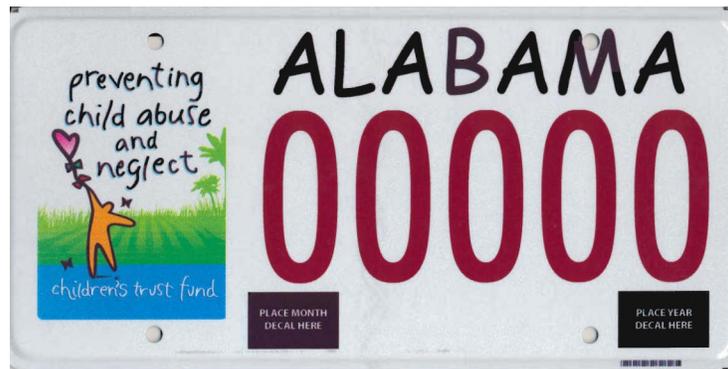
